National school lunch program information

DYSART SCHOOLS — Dysart Unified School District today announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program. Each school and/or the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the guidelines are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Children who are members of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) households, Cash Assistance (CA) units or Food Distribution Program on the Indian Reservation (FDPIR) households are automatically eligible for free meals. Foster children that are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms will be distributed to all households on the first day of school with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications also are available now at the front office in each school. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified at any time during the school year by program officials.

For officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving FDPIR, SNAP or CA only have to list their child's name, case number; an adult household member must sign the application. Households which do not list a case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of monthly income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the household member signing does not have a social security number, he/she must indicate that a social security number is not available. An adult household member must sign the application.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price policy Nutrition Services will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Ms. Cox 13825 W. Desert Cove Rd. Surprise Az. 85379 ph.#623-876-7075.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should submit an application. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the guideline levels.
